Lost Garden of Heligan away to...

> **WELCOME TO** THE SOUTH WEST

Period Drama – Stourhead, Wiltshire

The centrepiece of this world-famous landscape garden is a magnificent lake reflecting classical temples, mystical grottoes, and rare and exotic trees. Close your eyes and imagine any English period drama and Stourhead could be the setting. (Open all year) www.nationaltrust.org.uk/ stourhead

A Blaze of Colours - Westonbirt Arboretum, Gloucestershire

Marvel at over 15,000 species of tree from all over the world, brought together in one stunning place. The blaze of fiery colours provides a spectacular show, which is truly magical. Be amazed by the weird and wonderful sites such as the paperbark tree. Relax, escape or have an adventure amongst nature's giants. (Open all year) www.forestry.gov.uk/westonbirt

Sweeping Vistas - Prior Park, Bath Lose yourself in the sweeping vista of the garden, inspired by Capability Brown, with dreamy views of the Georgian city of Bath.

Walk through history to an Iron Age hill fort, Roman settlements, and 18th-century follies then cross the magnificent Palladian bridge, one of only four of this design in the world. (Open all year) www.nationaltrust.org.uk/

Vacation on location – Puzzlewood, Forest of Dean, Gloucestershire

A new Film and TV trail, Forest on Film, will launch in 2016 following Forest of Dean locations from international productions like Star Wars VII and The Huntsman. Encompassing an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, spectacular castles and acres of ancient woodland, the Forest of Dean has become a huge draw for film makers, hosting multi-million pound international motion-pictures. Magical - The Lost Gardens of Heliaan, Cornwall

Immerse yourself in Europe's largest garden restoration where a world of romance.

nostalgia and discovery awaits. Discover the intriguing story of how a thousand acres of beautiful, manicured and productive gardens were lost under a sea of brambles and Ivy after the outbreak of WW1. (Open all year). www.heligan.com

Exploration - Tyntesfield House, Gardens & Parkland, Bristol

This garden and estate balance faded beauty with an abundance of nature. Flower filled terraces, an empty lake, woodland, champion trees and a productive kitchen garden give much opportunity for exploration. (Open all year) www. nationaltrust.org.uk/tyntesfield

Far From the Madding Crowd - The Thomas Hardy Garden, Dorset

Experience a real English country cottage garden little changed from Hardy's time here in the mid-19th century. Escape further afield and walk into wild woodland landscapes where Hardy drew inspiration for his early novels and poems. (Open March 9 - November). www.nationaltrust.org.uk/ hardys-cottage

An English Estate - Killerton Gardens,

This 6,000 acre estate, with 20 farms and over 200 cottages is one of the largest ever bequeathed to the National Trust. Wander off the beaten track and find Killerton's smaller properties for a true taste of country life. Explore the Old Post Office, Medieval hall house and working watermill that grinds flour for Killerton's restaurant.(Open all year) www.nationaltrust.org.uk/killerton

Three Centuries of Garden Design at Hestercombe Gardens, Taunton

Come and lose vourself in fifty acres of lakes. temples, cascades, tranquil woodland walks, formal terraces, vivid colours and views that take your breath away. One of the most acclaimed aarden restorations anywhere in the UK. The combination of three centuries of stunning garden design bought back to life. (Open all year) www.hestercombe.com

900 acres of 'Capability' Brown - Longleat House and Gardens,

Longleat House is set in 900 acres of 'Capability' Brown designed landscape. The gardens and areas of the parkland were redesigned and modernised by 'Capability' Brown after 1757 where it was replaced with a fine lawn, a serpentine river, wooded hills, and gravel paths meandering round a shrubbery. Admire the elegance, structure and uniformity of the formal gardens then lose yourself in the romance and intrigue of the Secret Garden. www.longleat.co.uk

A Garden for Gardeners - RHS Rosemoor, Devon

Beauty waits around every corner at Rosemoor, Devon's showpiece Royal Horticultural Society garden. Taste delicious handmade cakes or a Devon cream tea all sourced from local ingredients and the garden itself. Wander at your own pace or take a group tour. (Open all year) www.rhs. ora.uk/aardens/rosemoor

Subtropical Island Discovery - Tresco, Isles of Scilly

Tresco Abbey Garden is internationally renowned as one of the finest sub-tropical flora and fauna collections in the Northern Hemisphere. Follow the terraced gardens down to the sparkling clear waters and gaze out over the hundreds of islets and rocks that make up the Isles of Scilly. The Queen of Crime - Agatha Christie's Greenway Garden, Devon

Walk in the favourite gardens of England's world-famous Queen of Crime, Agatha Christie. Discover the walled gardens, home to the restored peach house and vinery, then see Greenway Boathouse, scene of the crime in Dead Man's Folly. (Open Feb 13-November) www.nationaltrust.org.uk/

Late Victorian Magnificence -Llanhydrock, Cornwall

Take in the orderly beauty of this formal

English garden with its herbaceous borders, a fabulous parterre and colourful higher aardens filled with camellias, maanolias and rhododendrons. The estate is well worth exploring too, with ancient woodlands and tranquil riverside paths. Feeling adventurous? You can even hire a bike to make the most of this opportunity. (Closed Jan-Feb 14) www.nationaltrust.org.uk/ lanhydrock

Rainforests and biomes - Eden **Project, Cornwall**

Nestled in a huge crater, once a quarry, the Eden Project is home to massive Biomes housing the largest rainforest in captivity anywhere in the world and gardens representing almost every major climate type across the globe. A stunning construction set amongst fabulous contemporary gardens, exhibitions and even live performances! (Open all year) <u>www.edenproject.com</u>

Last but not least, naked gardeners -Gardens of Abbey House, Wiltshire

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Did you know...

You can save up to 15% on the cost of your caravan insurance by storing it as a CaSSOA-accredited site?

If you own a caravan, making sure you store it somewhere safe and secure when it is not in use is an obvious priority – and something we need to know about, too, in order to underwrite it.

There's nowhere in the UK that we generally don't cover, but for example if you're keeping it at home and you suddenly decide to keep it on your mate's farm where there's no locked gates, there might be no CCTV and anyone can go in and borrow your caravan on a permanent basis, then it could be a problem for us.

This is why it is part of the policy conditions that you need to notify us of any change in storage location and we need to preapprove that.

Generally it's not a problem, but the sort of things we're looking for is obviously is it secured? What sort of size are the gates? Are they locked? Is it in a dedicated storage area?

CaSSOA-accredited storage sites

One storage solution that we actively support – and reward our customers with up to 15% off their caravan insurance cover – is using a CaSSOA-accredited site.

CaSSOA stands for the Caravan Storage Site Owners' Association and these sites are recognised for being among the most secure places to store your caravan because they promote the highest security standards.

The insurance advantage

When it comes to your caravan insurance, if you choose a CaSSOA-approved site to store your caravan, we will give you up from 5% to 15% off your caravan insurance premiums. The discount depends depending on the site and what level of accreditation it has - ie bronze, silver or gold.

The reason we offer this discount is that these sites are very secure, and your caravan is at less risk of being stolen.

What CaSSOA sites include

There are currently some 400 <u>CaSSOA</u>-<u>accredited sites</u> to choose from, all of which have been independently assessed. When you choose one of these sites, you are doing so because they have superior security and access compared to other sites, often including alarms, secure fences and CCTV.

These sites are found all over the country, and you should not have to travel too far to find one. You can find a site at the website here: http://www.cassoa.co.uk/find-a-cassoa-site/ and by using the search function.

Do note, of course, that as a result of the superior security, they may be slightly more expensive than other sites, so this is something to plan for.

Easter egg rolling and bonnet making in Lancashire

Festival of Steam and **Transport in Kent**

It is 'Full Steam Ahead' once again at the annual Festival of Steam and Transport on Easter Sunday and Monday 16 and 17 April 2017. This family event has a carnival atmosphere

with all-inclusive festival fun and entertainment, including a free steam funfair, street acts, walkabout performers, together with classic and vintage cars, locomotives, steam traction engines, motorbikes, farm animals, traders and 'Call the Midwife' location taster tours.

Easter egg hunts in the capital

The National Trust (with Cadbury) are running egg hunts in many of its beautiful London properties over the Easter weekend. Visit Sutton House for its curious caravan, Fenton House for its pretty walled garden, and Red House for its wombat trail.



Don't fancy venturing too far from your caravan site?

If you'd rather spend Easter pitching up and simply relaxing in your 'van, then there are lots of caravan sites across the country that are running special Easter events ... for example, at the Beachside Holiday Park in Somerset you can meet their resident Easter bunny and a member of staff will lead the children around the park finding clues and solving Easter trivia questions.

Or, the Park Foot Caravan & Camping Park in Cumbria has several events running during the Easter break for children and adults alike, from a duck race to a champagne reception!

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The latest caravan gadgets to whet your appetite!



When you take your caravan out this summer, you might be looking enviously at the latest gadget in use on a neighbouring pitch. Stay one step ahead by making sure you've taken on board some of the useful and newest gadgets on the market.

Scrubba Wash

At some point during any caravan holiday you are going to need some laundry doing. Usually, that means finding the nearest launderette or stowing a space-hogging portable washing machine on board.

A <u>Scrubba Wash Bag</u> takes you back to basics by offering a simple collapsible bag into which you put the laundry, add water and soap and just rub – for "a machine quality wash" say the makers.

Caravan movers

For some time now, motorised caravan movers have been taking the backache and strain out of manoeuvring your caravan into the tightest of corners.

The latest generation of these devices take sophistication, ease of use and sheer handiness several steps forward – and as far as your caravan's concerned, not just forward, but backward, rotating clockwise or anti-clockwise.

The latest models from British makers, <u>Rhyno Caravan Motor Movers</u>, for example, come with full remote control, free factory fitting and a five-year guarantee.

Sun-powered digital radio

A radio has been a firm favourite as a breakfast companion for many a caravanner.

When you are enjoying a spot of outdoor listening, though, a major inconvenience has been the need for trailing cables to your caravan's battery or the risk of the radio's own batteries giving out at some critical moment in the broadcast.

So the welcome news is a cunning design by the established masters of radio design, Roberts, in the shape of the <u>sun-powered</u>, <u>digital SolarDAB 2</u> – which "uses the sun as a power socket" boast the makers.

Solar power

But why stop with your radio? <u>According to the online magazine</u> <u>Caravan Talk</u>, portable solar panels are one of the most popular caravan gadgets available.

As you might imagine, though, these do not come at all cheap and you might want to give solar panels more than a second thought or two before investing in what is likely to prove an expensive – if attention-grabbing – gadget.

Coffee as you like it

We all have our favourite way of making coffee – and without it, the day never seems to get off on the right note.

For sure, you might think about taking your coffee machine with you on that next caravan outing, but it is likely to take up a lot of valuable space.

A pocket-sized, hand-held espresso machine is now on the market from the aptly named Handpresso company.
